April 26 2020 —Third Sunday of Easter

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:

When the Risen Jesus appeared to the disciples after his resurrection, he would always come up on them with the greeting, "Peace be with you!" In last week's Gospel, we hear that greeting three times: at once when he entered their midst, once as he breathed the Holy Spirit on them for the forgiveness of sins, and once before he invited Thomas to faith by touching the wounds in his hands and feet and side. This week, Jesus greets the disciples, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified until faith in the Risen Lord transformed their fright into joy and amazement.





What do these events tell us about the Risen Lord? First, it seems that the appearance of the Lord in our broken world is unsettling, even to those who are closest to him. The disciples thought they were seeing a ghost and they were afraid... they could not yet "see" the Risen Lord with the eyes of faith until they were at "peace" with God. Secondly, the presence of the Risen Lord was not centered around what came before (the Crucifixion) or anything that would come after, but instead was centered in the fullness and integrity of that moment of peace. Third, it was an announcement of God's reconciliation with humanity. In Hebrew, the concept of *shalom* ("peace") has the technical connotation of prosperity and well-being

through the desired state of harmony and communion between two covenant partners. In Jesus' greeting of *peace*, Our Lord was affirming that humanity and God had been reconciled, even if the disciples did not immediately recognize or realize it.

During the Sacred Liturgy, there are two times when we greet each other in peace. The first is in the Communion Rite. The priest prays the Lord's words, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give you; look not on our sins, but on the faith of the Church, and graciously grant peace and unity in accordance with your will..." It is in this peace, a peace willed by God and prayed for by all present, that the priest offers the greeting, "The peace of the Lord be with you always," to which all respond, "And with your spirit." As we prepare for Communion, we are articulating the profound union which is about to take place with God, and through that union, everyone who partakes of the Eucharist. As a further sign of the peace we have been praying for




during the Communion Rite, all present are invited to "share with one another a sign of peace". The age of coronavirus would seem to be one of those things that are determined to upset the "peace" shared between people as, even with the good intention of protecting health, it separates people and subtlety suggests that each person, each contact could be aiding the spread of "the enemy". Maybe there will have to be a relearning of how we express peace to each other on the other side of this thing, but one thought that comes to mind is that peace is always a risk... it always requires us to go outside of ourselves and trust another.



The other time when the greeting of "Peace be with you" is used at Mass is when the bishop is present. The bishop represents the unity of the Body of Christ. The bishop does nothing less than invoke that profound unity as he greets the gathered Church in *peace*. St. Ignatius of Antioch reminds us, "Wherever the bishop shall appear, let the multitude of the people also be, for wherever Jesus Christ is, there also is the Church." Ultimately the peace which is offered by the Lord, received by the Church, and prayed in the Liturgy is a state of intimate unity and reconciliation with one another and with God. Easter *peace* is the first, best, lasting gift of from our Risen Lord.

Catholic Charities announces new COPE Line to help people deal with COVID-19 related stress

SPRINGFIELD – Catholic Charities Diocese of Springfield in Illinois announced a new community service **starting April 13th** called the "Catholic Charities COPE Line" for people who are experiencing situational stress and anxiety related to the Coronavirus Outbreak, the nonprofit agency announced today.

The service is free of charge and available to the public for people living in the 28-county service area of the Springfield Diocese. "During this time of confusion and uncertainty it is very important to respect our thoughts

and feelings, and to reach out when those thoughts and feelings become overwhelming," said Theresa Loy, L.C.P.C., Therapeutic Services Coordinator for Catholic Charities.

"Sometimes people just need someone to talk to." The Catholic Charities COPE Line is <u>not</u> formal therapy or an emergency hotline. However, you will be referred for a conversation with a qualified Catholic Charities mental health professional who can help you with ef-

fective coping strategies. There are no fees, enrollment forms or application processes.

"Catholic Charities is committed to helping those in need in the communities we serve. We want folks to know that they are not in this alone. Since many people are being asked to stay home to minimize the spread of this infectious disease, we want to reach out to them. We encourage anyone who may be struggling with managing their stress during this difficult time to call the COPE Line and schedule a talk with one of our professional and empathetic Catholic Charities therapists," Loy said.




