

This weekend we celebrate the 244th year of our nation's independence and sovereignty among the family of nations. Pope Leo XIII wrote in 1890 that, "If... the natural law bids us give of our best affection and of our best devotedness to our native land so that a good citizen does not hesitate to brave death for his country, much more is it the duty of Christians to be similarly affected to the Church."

Pope Leo places patriotism along with its habits and affections that come to us as part of "natural law", that is, through an intrinsic understanding of what is 'right' and what is 'wrong' that comes to us instinctively, as if by our very nature as human beings. He argues that it is this 'natural law" that teaches us love of nation and homeland which in turn is the model of the devotion to the Church which is learned through "divine law".

In our contemporary age, in particular one like ours that is totally inimical to the very idea that any kind of moral code is written into our 'nature', it is easy to dismiss patriotism as quaint and perhaps a bit old-fashioned... something left for simpler people in a simpler time, when too many people were willing to turn a blind eye to the imperfections and even injustices in our society. Like the differences between men and women, like the arbitrariness of being born in one nation or another, as senseless as the whimsical cosmic lottery which determines whether one is born to a rich or poor, or black or white, or to a healthy or dysfunctional family, 'nature' seems to some as cruel and unjust a system as can be devised to explain the righteousness of anything, much less this patriotic observance.

But Christians understand that God's grace builds on nature. Indeed, nature is the sign of God's providence. Thus, if a nation be founded on just principles as can be found in the hearts of men and women of goodwill (that is, those being in a natural state of desiring the good, even without the illumination of faith), then in spite of its imperfections, a nation always has a divine ideal to strive for, that it may become something greater than it is now or has been in the past, simply by pursuing what is good.

I would argue that being a good citizen is part-and-parcel of being a good Christian. A good Christian recognizes that they are personally in constant need of God's renewing grace and mercy. A good Christian would recognize that need among his countrymen and women in rendering right judgment (as a Gift of the Holy Spirit) in acts of governance and in imploring God for his mercy for the evils and injustices which it suffers. Further a good Christian would recognize that as both part of the Body of Christ and part of the body of a civil society, that each has a duty and responsibility to help make their nation a better place by the work that they do, to bring the grace of divine redemption, even unto giving their lives for others. Christians have much to offer our pluralistic society in terms of our understanding of human nature and its destiny wrapped in the mystery of God. When Christians remain tentative and secluded, unable or unwilling to provide their distinctive insights and convictions to build a better society, we all suffer.

This year in the midst of a mean-spirited General Election, civil unrest based on racial tensions, a health crisis, severe economic distress, a sense of deteriorating personal rights in the advancement of an increasingly socialist agenda on part of some, a scarcity of healthy political discourse and leadership, a growing disparity between the 'haves' and 'have nots', and continued assaults on the dignity of the family and on the unborn, there would be many reasons to retreat from a celebration of who we are as a nation ... even to condemn it for these faults. But on this Fourth of July, I ask our parishioners to make it a point to pray for our nation. Really step back for a moment and offer a prayer... a rosary... fasting and penance... whatever it may be. These 'faults' and 'challenges' that for so many are a reason for recrimination and mourning are an opportunity for those holding the virtue of Christian hope. If we can use that hope, individually and as a society, to live up to the highest calling of our founding, that we hold 'self-evident truths' that preserve individual rights to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness", then I have confidence that our best days are ahead of us... if we choose them.

2020-2021 Bible Verse Theme

This year our faith formation Bible verse theme is Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." We will build on our faith formation study of the fruits of the Holy Spirit from last year by studying Holy Heroes, the Catholic saints, who lived their lives sharing the fruits of the Holy Spirit in service to others. Throughout the 2019-20 school year, whenever students made the choice to put their self-interests aside and do what God was calling them to do, they could identify Holy Moments as a fruit of the Holy Spirit. Our faculty wanted to build on this faith formation with the next Bible verse theme. As we prayed and contemplated our current situation with reopening schools, we were inspired and selected Philippians 4:13. We want our school family to realize that our Holy Heroes, the saints, experienced lives with Holy Moments and challenges. In Christ, through prayer and petition, their faith strengthened and their discipleship grew as well. Our staff nominated several Bible verses for this year and Philippians 4:13 was chosen as the theme for us, given our previous year of faith formation. We believe in the motto, "In Christ, I can!" We will use it to encourage each other as we reopen St. Dominic School in August.

Holy Moments Mass

Again this year, we will celebrate the Holy Moments in our lives when we recognize that we have shared the fruits of the Holy Spirit, just like our Holy Hero role models. Each month one grade will showcase a Holy Hero during our morning assemblies and help us learn about the specific ways they shared one fruit of the Holy Spirit. Since we are St. Dominic School of St. Anthony of Padua Parish, we will begin by showcasing St. Dominic for our school and St. Anthony for our parish. In August, Fr. Tom Donovan will lead the showcase for St. Anthony and Mrs. Frericks will lead the showcase for St. Dominic. In September, our third grade class will showcase Saint Teresa of Calcutta and the way she shared the fruit of the Holy Spirit - love - throughout her life in service to others. Each month we will spotlight the students who lead our faith formation and Holy Hero showcase at a weekend Holy Moments Mass with St. Anthony Parish.

First Communion/Confirmation


