"Faster than a speeding bullet... more powerful than a locomotive... able to leap tall buildings in a single bound. Look in the sky! It's a bird! It's a plane! It's SUPERMAN! Yes, Superman, strange visitor from a faroff planet, with abilities beyond that of mortal men. Yes, Superman, who can change the course of mighty rivers, bend steel in his bear hands. And who, disguised as Clark Kent, mild-manned reporter for a great metropolitan newspaper, fights a never-ending battle for truth, justice, and the American way!"

Superman, of course, is the famous character created by Jerry Siegel and Joe Schuster in 1938 for DC Comics and has since appeared in every kind of media, films,

television, and other adaptations. Superman is well-known for his feats of strength and virtue as he defends the people of Metropolis from the criminal element, and in particular his archnemesis, Lex Luthor. Superman was widely known for his mighty works, but protected himself and those who were close to him, by disguising himself as Clark Kent. Indeed, Superman somehow kept his "Clark Kent" identity secret from the romantic interest in his life, Lois Lane, who could never quite figure out why Clark was always missing when Superman was on the scene.

While Superman is a work of fiction, his resonance in contemporary culture is almost universal. His story is so compelling and interesting— the stepping off point for great dreams and fantasy of young people of every age. As we read the encounter of Jesus with his disciples at Caesarea Philippi this week, I wonder, what were they thinking?

The disciples had seen Jesus in action... healing the sick, raising the dead, calming the storm... but who did they really think he was? Was he a miracle worker? A prophet? A superhero? A flim-flam man? Who was this Jesus, really? Could they put the pieces together, or were they going to stay blinded to the truth, as Lois Lane was with respect to Superman? Jesus was daring them to think... to dream... perhaps even to make a mistake... but to be ready to make a discovery that would change the entire pathway and meaning of their relationship.

Peter said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God!" And with that, Peter announces the drama that had been building in the Gospel of Matthew, and would come to its fulfillment as Jesus begins to show how he intends to fulfill the identity of Christ and Messiah. It would be through self-sacrifice. It would be in obedience to the father. It would be by allowing himself to be captured by those who would wish to do him harm... all of the evil forces in the world converging on him... that he could vanquish them all by rising again on the Third Day. The disciples were warned not to tell others... to keep the




secret for now. The forces of evil did not need to know all of this quite yet. Jesus needed to protect his friends. He also needed them to stay with him for a bit longer that they could learn more a bit more of what his mission was all about. Peter, afterall, was being built up to be the "Rock", looking beyond the Resurrection and Ascension of our Lord, to the day when the Church would take up the mission of this Christ.

I think that another reason why Jesus revealed his full identity at this time, was to remind his disciples that, yes, he was the Lord of the sea and skies, and of life and death itself. The disciples had witnessed this in his ministry and were aware of his special power. But, by revealing his identity as Lord and Son of the Living God, I think he was also revealing that not only was he with them in the moments of might and miracles, but also in those routine moments. He didn't abandon his disciples by snapping his fingers and travelling across the vast wastelands of desert in seconds. He didn't leave them alone to do "God things" while they took the time to eat or sleep when the day was done. He didn't shower them with earthly riches to feed the multitudes or even provide relief to the poor. He stayed with them in these quiet moments, using the goods and blessings of nature to sustain his earthly ministry. He not only blessed the common with his presence, but taught his disciples that the Lord God of the Universe immersed himself completely in their lives... even the more mundane moments that perhaps pass unnoticed to the witness of the Gospel. He was not a God of disguises and secret identities, but the Divine Presence which endures with his people in great and small moments alike.

## St. Anthony Men's Society Drive Through Only Chicken Dinner-September 20


