Have you ever met anyone *famous*... perhaps receiving the opportunity to shake a hand in a reception line after a concert or performance? Perhaps having a program or baseball autographed before the big ball game? Maybe you had a chance encounter in an airport or restaurant while travelling? Of course, some people are more famous than others, and for different reasons.

I remember my first November at St. Anthony's when someone came to the sacristy to tell me that we had a Medal of Honor recipient, Colonel Roger Donlon, in the congregation that night. I learned that he was the first Medal of Honor recipient of the

Vietnam War, who received the Medal for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity, above and beyond the call of duty,' while commanding a special forces unit. That evening however, he blended in with everyone else, and when I asked if anyone sitting next to him had introduced themselves to strangers or shaken his hand, nobody responded. But when he was identified, he was rightfully given a warm round of applause from those gathered that night. Interestingly, I believe it was also the same night the Oscar Meyer Weiner-mobile also appeared at St. Anthony's, which everyone identified easily and got a good laugh over. After Mass, I did take the opportunity to shake hands with both guests (our war hero and the wiener-mobile driver) and to thank them for coming and being with us.

Encountering those who are famous leaves an impression on us. We marvel at the prodigious talent they have. We honor how they stepped up in their role to change history. We identify their connection with causes and movements which are influential over all of society. We appreciate how they entertain us. For sure there may be more impactful people in our lives who will never be famous—our teachers, our parents, our mentors, our benefactors—but there is always a thrill to encounter a 'celebrated' person...a 'celebrity'...whose reputation precedes them.

The fulfillment of the Christmas Season comes with the Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord. In this celebration, we commemorate that the Lord who took our flesh and lived our life, did not reject the cleansing baptism of John. Our Lord did not see it as something beneath him or under his dignity, as rightfully he might have. Jesus did not need to receive a baptism for the for-giveness of sins. John knew this and protested against Jesus coming into the waters, but at the command of the Lord, John relented. Thus Jesus brought his own fame and his holiness, his reputation and celebrity into the wilderness where John was preaching and received baptism... not to be cleansed by the experience as everyone was, but to cleanse the waters of baptism themselves, that they might not only be a sign of cleansing and forgiveness, but that the Spirit itself might dwell in those waters, and everyone who receives the sign of baptism might have a sharing of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. In that encounter, all who are baptized are transformed.

The greatest power of fame and celebrity is the ability to change our lives. When we might have met a great athlete in our youth, might it have inspired better sportsmanship? When we heard a wonderful musician on the radio or on stage, might we have been inspired to imitate their craftsmanship by pulling down a guitar and working through the chords? When we meet someone who is particularly saintly, does it not inspire us to greater holiness. In the Baptism of the Lord, St. Augustine reminds us that in the Sacrament of Baptism, it is not the priest or the dea-



con who baptizes, but *Christ himself* who baptizes. We have a moment where we encounter Christ through sacramental signs and mysteries, but that encounter is no less real. It is this brush with 'fame' at the beginning of our Christian journey that is meant to be a memorable, water-shed moment—a brush with immortality where we get to keep a piece of that by the grace by invitation of the one who made the waters themselves holy.

First Reconciliation Meeting

Due to Covid there will not be the group meeting we usually hold but Mrs. Nytes will be communicating the information through letters and email.

Question: So, what is the story about the moral implications of taking the COVID-19 vaccine? Have aborted human fetal cells been used in the design and manufacture of the vaccine? Fr. Tom Replies: In classic moral theology, it is considered morally illicit to participate in the evil being perpetrated by another. For instance, one would be directly contributing the crime of a person who robbed a bank, if he or she were to drive a getaway car, or otherwise enabled or encouraged the perpetrator in the commission of the crime. On the other hand, one would be contributing to the crime only indirectly if you were the mechanic replacing the tires on the car a week before the robbery. Presuming you didn't know of the intended crime, you would be innocent of blame or of any moral fault in the evil to be perpetrated.

In the case of vaccines, medicines, and even surgical procedures, we are in an age where it is becoming increasingly important to be aware of the moral implications of medical interventions. Catholics of good conscience understand that we have a duty to promote and encourage drug manufacturers to use the most ethical of means to produce their medicines, refusing to receive products produced from the use of aborted human fetal cell

lines. However, while many vaccines avoid using human cell lines for the production of 'biological products', most of the vaccines in production today have had at least some exposure to incidental testing using human cell lines. That being said, COVID-19 is a very serious disease which needs to be eradicated... a good in itself. Can we accept a vaccine or another treatment which has been generated through any level of use of unethical means? Of the vaccines which have been approved thus far, those manufactured by Pfizer and Moderna have not used cell lines derived from abortions in the manufacture of their vaccines. Both vaccines have used cell lines in incidental testing to demonstrate safety. While this is not good, it is extremely remote in its participation in the evil of abortion. Indeed, the vaccines could have been produced without the testing. There is a greater present good of promoting and protecting health produces a positive "double effect" can be cited as a sufficient intention to avoid evil and achieve a greater good. However, the Church also does recognize the right of individuals to refuse the vaccine on these grounds. This is a complicated issue which I hope to address further in the coming weeks, and also in the light of the upcoming March for Life.
