At the end of today's Gospel, Jesus says. "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise form the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all nations, beginning in Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

No doubt when Jesus was speaking to his disciples, he meant "you" as being the actual, personal witnesses to his death and resurrection. But how do we understand this Gospel when we understand "you" to mean "us" in this very day and age? Perhaps the distance between us and the Lord is

such that we are nervous about affirming our status and role as 'witnesses'. How can we be witnesses to the dying and rising of Christ? We have not seen Jesus walking around in the flesh healing the sick. We were not present at that Last Supper when he said "This is my Body" and "This is my Blood". We did not have the opportunity to put our hands in his and fell his side, that we could be transformed from unbelief into belief by an encounter with his Risen Body.

The Church explains the connection between the past and the present and the future through the process of "Tradition". Our English understanding of the word, I believe, is very loose and imprecise. We think of traditions as things that individuals and families do such as eating Thanksgiving Dinner at noon at grandma's house. While such a tradition would be a nostalgic and perhaps even wonder habitual thing to do through the years, even as the family changes, that's really not what is meant by "Tradition".

At its root, "Tradition" is a "handing over" or "handing down" of something important. The word "traitor" has a relationship to the word "tradition", in that a 'traitor' hands over state secrets or be-'tray's confidences. In the case of Judas, he 'hands over' the Lord to the authorities for arrest. It is not simply a passing of an item from one person to another, but it is an entrusting of a "stewardship" over something special and valued. For a traitor to betray something entrusted to him as a stewardship is to break the promise of bearing responsibility for something great or valuable or rare.

And so St. Paul writes of his ministry as a 'stewardship' of the graces he has received from the revelation of Christ. Christ was revealed to him vividly when he was knocked off his horse on the road to Damascus... his life was changed forever. He had not met the Lord in his body, but heard the voice, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" (Acts 9) The impact and meaning of that encounter was defined by the years he spent in the Church in Damascus with Ananias. Indeed, after study and prayer and reflection, Paul was able to see that life-defining moment as a precious gift from God that was meant to lead him in a certain direction and engage him in a special ministry... one entrusted to him and him alone to witness to the ways the Lord had transformed his life... inside and out. He was once a persecutor of Christian followers, and now he was an apostle who could speak with the authority of the living Christ working through him.

Christ continues to speak to his people and call them to life-changing witness and ministry. What is the role of the Church? It is to be a receiver of that testimony that comes from its members and it is to be a school of discerning the voice of the living and true God among its members... You are witnesses of these things: the dying and rising of Christ. It is through the centuries-old witness of the Church that we first hear the Word of God as it is handed down as "Sacred Tradition" from one generation to the next. It is then through the Sacraments that our life in Christ grows, where we encounter the very living Lord in cleansing, nourishment, forgiveness, healing, and power. As our lives are gradually transformed by the sacramental mysteries, we are better able to see him at work in our lives through the eyes of faith, and thus are better able to witness to others of his power at work in our lives. It is a faith that works its way through the members of the Church according to God's plan and his providence. Our role is to be open to those moments of revelation to hear the Lord call and to receive it as a stewardship which encourages us to act in those moments of invitation so that others may come to greater faith as well.
