A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



Our First Reading this weekend finds Moses marveling at the gift of God's Law which was given him to be given to the Children of Israel. I was struck by Moses' response. He tells the people to "observe (the Law) carefully" so that everyone who sees the wisdom and intelligence of the Law and the People who follow the Law may say, "This great nation is truly a wise and intelligent people!"

Our laws were established in an age where the rights and obligations of the individual were paramount, and where each citizen was presumed to have the right and duty of forming those laws through the election of representatives to the legislative and executive functions of government. Our forebears were convinced that the power of law comes from the consent of those who live under the same law. They had experienced the 'top-down' law that comes from royal

fiat and from other coercive power, but did not reflect the needs or the respect inherent in the humanity of the lower classes. They had experienced the tyranny which undermined essential rights that they came to see and understand as written into the human person by their creator... 'inalienable rights' of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness... were being denied. And so, using this essential understanding of God's goodness and of human nature which all people of goodwill could accept, and looking at how the coercive power of government could be divided, such that the powers would work against each other in what we call "checks and balances", concepts such as 'due process', habeas corpus, subsidiarity (where law finds its best expression in the lowest levels of state and local governments, rather than in top-down expressions from the federal government), and an encyclopedia of freedoms which are enumerated for protection from undue government interference... the right to a free press, free religious expression, public gatherings, self-defense, non-self-incrimination, and others... would arise and be enshrined in very fabric of our nation and of our national identity. Our government officials, public servants, and military members—none of these mighty powers swear their allegiance to the President or Congress. They swear to "protect and defend the Constitution of the United States of America." While our nation is in great need of continual renewal every generation in its understanding and respect for its law, its history, and the civic responsibility of its citizens, it is a system of governance which has robustly supported the people of our nation and encouraged their ingenuity and industry.

As we approach the 20th anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, as we strain and squawk under the weight of the pressing social issues of our day, as we suffer and mourn the losses of the COVID pandemic, and as well look to an uncertain future in foreign affairs, the economy, and so many other areas of concern, I invite us as Catholics to see this as an opportunity to be leaven for our broken society. It is a people who value and wish to see society restored to its greatest ideals as a free nation under God who will receive the awe and respect as a wise and intelligent nation in our own day. May a nation renewed in its devotion to peace, justice, and freedom be so close to God as to bear his law, his very Word in our hearts and our minds!

This week we will take a collection after Communion at each of the Masses to provide for humanitarian relief to the people of Haiti by way of Catholic Relief Services (CRS). As you know from the news, the people of Haiti have suffered both earthquake and tropical storms though the last month, which has left many people homeless, hungry, and hopeless. If you miss the collection and would like to make a contribution, please provide an envelope clearly marked "Haiti" in the parish office or in next week's collection, and we will make sure it gets directed appropriately.






