A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:




Envy. Jealousy. I thought we dealt with those last week? The disciples embarrassed Jesus by arguing amongst themselves "who is the greatest?" Jesus settled that argument, didn't he? But this week we hear that the disciples are perturbed by the fact that they "...saw someone driving demons out in your name. We tried to prevent him because he does not follow us!" (Mark 9:38) To which Jesus replies, "do not prevent him.... whoever is not against us is for us." Angelic teachings of the coming of the Kingdom, of recognition the Messiah, and the richness of faith are so much easier to hear than a call to conversion of heart. Conversion is hard. Conversion requires us to change our atti-

tudes towards others. Last week, we heard how Jesus placed the heavy load of self-regard upon his cross as something which needs to be crucified in order to live new life. It is not about who is greatest, but who can humble himself in order to serve the least among us. This week, Jesus places the heavy load of our judgmental expectations about others and our skepticism about their share in the spiritual gifts that flow from above, showing us that we must not separate ourselves from those who desire to do the Lord's will, even when we unexpectedly recognize the favor of God's gifts flowing through them and their goodness.

This teaching would have very important implications for the unity of Christians, who seem hopelessly split, first between Orthodox and Catholic sects which have the integrity of the priesthood and the Eucharistic sacrifice, and then in the West through the "Protestant Revolution" which jettisoned even these essential signs of unity, causing the breakdown of Christianity into perhaps more than 30,000 different 'denominations' by estimates. We know that we have brother and sister Christians who reverence the Bible and call on the name of Jesus in their prayer, but lack the essential signs of unity found in the Eucharistic Sacrifice and its integral priesthood and teaching authority (found in the Petrine Ministry). How do we approach them? Moreover, how do we deal with them... perhaps our own children... when they have walked away from the fullness of the faith which is found in the Catholic Church?

I think the first answer is that we recognize that those who "are not against us are with us." It is a great sign of unity when we can join our non-Catholic, Christian friends in prayer and

in public witness to the faith. I would also say that we as Catholics need to resolve to be the best Catholics we can be, by understanding and being conversant in our faith with others. The Venerable Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen once said that "there are not one hundred people in the United States who hate the Catholic Church, but there are millions who hate what they wrongly perceive the Catholic Church to be." Our faith is one that *proposes*, rather than *imposes*, and what we propose is beautiful and compelling when spoken of with love. Do you believe what we believe about the dignity of the human person, created male and female, and loved by God? Then you have a place with us in defending the dignity of life and marriage. Do you believe that our Lord lives and continues to fill the world with signs of his grace and mercy? Then you have a place with us at this Eucharist. Do you believe that human be-



ings have an eternal destiny which finds its fulfillment in being happy with God forever? Then you have a place with us as we celebrate and anticipate the coming of the Kingdom.

While it is good to recognize the diversity of gifts given to many believers, it does not absolve us from the work to bring the separated parts of the Mystical Body of Christ into visible unity in the Church. There will not be a heaven for Catholics and another for Anglicans and another for Lutherans. There is not a separate Jewish heaven. We are called to unity in Christ, which is going to take a lot of work and a lot of conversion of hearts, but it is the will of Christ who first gave the gifts to those "others" who "do not walk with us". We resolve our differences by being fully who we have been called to be... not a watered-down version of Catholicism which is trying to 'play along to get along', but as the flowering oasis of truth and faith and life inviting others (and challenging ourselves) to more perfectly bring to completion the work of the Kingdom on earth.
