## A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



**“The Lord has done great things for us, we are filled with joy!”** Psalm 126 aptly follows our reading from the prophet Jeremiah today, as Jeremiah was referring to the coming of that joyous day when the ‘ruminant of Israel’ would be released from their captivity in the North. The psalm speaks of “when the Lord brought us back, we were like men dreaming”. The captivity Jeremiah and the psalmist speaks of is the Babylonian Captivity, which lasted for about 50 years in the 6th century BC. The King of Judah, Jehoiakim, was a weak man, engaged in idolatry, wrapped up in tenuous political alliances, and buying off the King of Persia, the great Nebuchadnezzar, with tribute. After about 20 years of siege and threat, the Babylonians finally leveled Jerusalem and the temple and placed the residents in exile until King Cyrus of Persia released them in about 540 BC. It would thus be possible that young children taken from Jerusalem earlier in the century would now be old men and women, barely aware of their heritage, and having to rebuild... having to start over. They would know the stories of the “good old days” from their parents, and would have spent their entire lives dreaming for the possibility of a new start, if not for them, then maybe their children or their children’s children. But having cleansed the people with the chastisement of exile, a new king was restored and a new temple would be built. There would be a new beginning which would be seen as a time of grace from the Lord. While one generation went forth from the nation weeping, with the seeds of a brighter tomorrow, it would be these children of Israel who would return, rejoicing at the new harvest of faith and friendship with the Lord.



How does a person become Catholic? New Catholics are normally welcomed into the Church at the Easter Vigil, following some months of formation and preparation in a program commonly called *The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults*, or simply, RCIA. The Catholic Church recognizes the importance of taking the time with candidates for initiation to make sure that their entrance into the Church is not simply a passing fancy, or a spur-of-the-moment decision. Rather, Christian Initiation is but one step of a lifetime commitment to conversion to Christ. The goal of RCIA is to assist new Catholics to properly discern their call to enter into the Church and then to help them embrace this

lifestyle in all of its elements and practices, including: scripture, worship, morality, doctrine, and fellowship.

We are looking to begin with this year’s RCIA group, and we already have several people who are interested in beginning this process. We will have an organizational meeting for anyone who is interested in becoming Catholic on Wednesday, November 3 at 7 pm in the “Quilt Room”. We plan to use this meeting to figure out the best time to meet going forward and to have a simple introduction to what the RCIA process looks like. And just to make it more comfortable for our potential candidates, we invite family and friends to come along and be their ‘sponsor’ at least for the night, so that our hopeful-candidates can feel welcome and confident in where they are going and what they are doing. Afterall, the first step is usually the hardest!

Where do candidates come from? They typically don’t read the bulletin. They typically don’t have the courage to come in off the streets to meet people they don’t know (especially priests). They typically don’t know our liturgy or practices or beliefs for things beyond what they might have heard— rightly or wrongly— from the media or their own study, or from other Catholics. So where do candidates come from? They are personally invited by family and friends to “come and see”. Please ask around in your family and among your friends and contacts. Ask your spouse, if he or she is not Catholic. Is this the year when you might be interested in learning more about the Church? Is this the year to explore becoming Catholic? If they are unable to join us for the organizational meeting on November 3, please have them call our parish office at (217) 222-5996, and we will make sure to connect with them and help them get into the process.

## A Message from Mrs. Carol Frericks—Principal

### Our Lady of Kibeho — Pray for Us

During October, our 6th-grade class, along with their teacher, Mrs. Tera Smith, taught our school about the appearances and messages of Our Lady of Kibeho. When Mary appeared in November 1981 through 1989, Our Lady's message was clear to the three high-school-age girls, "I am the Mother of the Word. I come to console you because I have heard your prayers. Let me help you, let me give you a hand to lead you through this suffering. Let me give you a prayer to hold on to so that you can work through the suffering of this world." Our Lady of Kibeho instructed the girls about the importance of praying the Rosary. She encouraged them to leave behind their double path and embrace the only one worth traveling — the one that leads to Christ. Mary made it known that her message was "not only for Rwanda or Africa—but for the ENTIRE world." Our Lady of Kibeho told Marie-Claire, one of the Rwandan teenagers, to reteach a special rosary called the "Seven Sorrows of Mary" Rosary to the whole world.

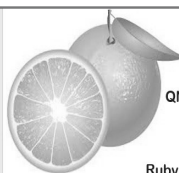

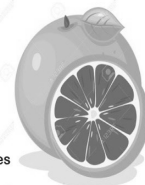
