A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



At the close of the Church year, we are offered the feast of Christ the King—a twentieth century addition to the calendar that assures us that our hope is not in politicians or politics, not in worldly power and influence, not in the science and worldly wisdom at our fingertips, but in the glorious reign of our Lord here and in the world to come. The history of the 20th century is a story of advances in science, technology, education, and communications, but a growing tendency to isolate and marginalize the individual human person, devaluing human life and dignity in favor of economic or political advantage that can be seized for worldly power. The long, sad legacy of war and social disorder during the 20th century into our own day finds its roots in the

frightening eclipse of human respect and dignity in our supposedly-enlightened age.

The image the Church gives us is a corrective to these destructive attitudes. Our vindication comes from Jesus gloriously reigning from the cross. Our Lord demonstrates that power is made perfect in self-emptying sacrifice, in love for the neighbor, and in complete trust in a Kingdom which is not of this world. Looking upon our Lord on the cross, we are faced with a decision. Do we believe in him and the path he lays before us for a lasting peace? Is our faith strong and courageous enough, that we are ready to take up our cross and follow him? That has been the question from the Gospel of Mark which we read all during 2021. Calling to mind all of the disciple's questions, witnessing all of the healings and mighty deeds he has done, recognizing in ourselves the anxiety of the rich young man and the faith of the blind man from Jericho, experiencing the vulnerability of the woman with two small coins at the temple, and all the others.... are we ready? Are we going to follow him when he calls us?



Thursday is Thanksgiving Day! This week there will be no school on Wednesday, thus no public Mass at St. Anthony or St. Dominic on Wednesday. The parish office will be open on Wednesday from 8 am to noon, and then closed on Thursday and Friday. Mass on Thursday Morning, Thanksgiving Day, will be at 9 am. cation for all of our future needs. May Thanksgiving Day be a day of blessings and rememebrance and celebration for your families.


Speaker System Update: We have now received funding to cover the new speaker system and a bit more. I have dispatched a deposit check to our contractors in charge of this project, and I should be receiving further information soon about the timing of installation. As I said earlier, there may be a delay due to 'supply chain issues', but we are at the front of the line with our 'earnest money' in as the equipment arrives.

While the funding for this project is covered, we are also still looking for additional special support for ongoing bills and obligations. As you know, we are no longer doing an Annual Catholic Services Appeal, but rather are offering the diocese a "tithe", assessed at 10% of our income each month. This requires us to have cash to pay what used to be an annual appeal on a monthly basis through the year. While the overall assessment to the diocese, hopefully, will be a bit smaller than the 12% we paid before over an annual basis, the monthly payments makes our cash flow a bit more difficult.

Right now we are holding our November 2021 Health Insurance bill back, as we have not had cash to pay it yet. This bill is \$20,000. Any assistance with this would be appreciated. We also expect to have our prior year pension bill come in, which will cost in excess of \$50,000. Again, any special assistance that our parishioners can provide would be greatly appreciated! Thank you for your support of St. Anthony Church and St. Dominic School!



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
