#### January 2, 2022 — The Epiphany of the Lord(C)

### A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:

I will out of town for a retreat-conference this week. The office and school will be resuming regular hours. Please be aware that some of the weekday Masses may become Communion Services, as I have not yet re-worked the schedule for substitutions as the bulletin went to press.



It has been a remarkably busy Advent and Christmas season this year, and as I tried to mention in my Christmas homily, a particular focus for this year is that there are a number of families in our parish that are in need of your prayers following the passing of loved ones during the season, Perhaps the most enduring metaphor of the Lord's presence is that of light, and it is un-

to that Light that we pray for souls of the faithful departed, that they may have eternal rest and receive a share in that light perpetually. Light is the means by which we see, and sight in the scriptures refers not only to physical sight, but especially spiritual sight.

The magi were lead by the light of a star to find the Lord. It was a light that preceded them until it remained stationary over the place where the child was (Matthew 2:9). It would seem then, that the phenomenon lasted for some time, but afterwards disappeared. This celestial behavior would be a most unusual for a star, any star, gracing our skies, as the constellations and times of coming and going for most stars appear stable for thousands and thousands of years. But there was something special about this star... something different. It was the Star of Bethlehem, for which there is some historical and scientific credibility for its appearance. But what about its behavior?

I'm not sure that we can ever adequately reconstruct the experience of the enlightenment of the minds of these astrologers, but the bottom line is that they were amazed by the sign, and saw it as a compelling reason to leave what they were doing to go and worship the One, True God. After seeing the Child and doing homage, they returned home to their studies, to their own country, and perhaps even to their own religion once again. But this moment was one of such immense importance that their lives were put on complete hold until they could make the long and treacherous journey to worship.

Each week we find ourselves drawn to worship and an encounter with Christ... not by a star or some other natural phenomenon, but by the wisdom taught by those who formed us in the Christian faith... perhaps our parents and most likely our teachers and catechists and pastors from years gone by. Worship takes us out of our element and places us on sacred ground where we say and do sacred things. And then, as the magi, we stand up and go home when the encounter is done. The star has served its purpose and its light blends back into the the constellation of all the lights in the sky. The magi were called but once for this encounter with the Lord, but we receive this call regularly— at least once a week—to come do our homage at his altar. I wonder if it is because we need so much more practice with the eyes of faith that are dimmed by the darkness of sin and, perhaps even more importantly, indifference to the things of God?

What has become heavy on my mind and heart in this year filled with funerals has been the call to 'perpetual light': "Eternal rest grant to them, O Lord, and let *perpetual light* shine on them." There is a call for each of us that is so compelling and so inevitable when the Lord comes for each of us at the end of our lives, that the light we follow is not a passing light— one that shines for a while and returns us back to where we were beforehand. This is a light that will become our life... that will become our *only* concern... a light that will lead us to an eternal destiny, if we can only catch a glimpse it with the eyes of faith and use it to guide us through the crude distractions often found in glowing neon signgs and LED screens—those lights which flood our everyday world.

We have been considering the Lord's advent, "in history, in mystery, and in glory." As we hear the story of the magi courageously following the light, may we be reminded of our own obligation and opportunity to follow the light and do worship, that when he calls, we may be ready to enjoy the good things of the Lord in the land of the living.

#### Celebrating the Liturgical Season of Christmas with Art
