A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:

Six years ago, in 2016, Pope Francis proclaimed a Year of Mercy, which was to be celebrated throughout the Church. Unlike many of the year-long celebrations the Church gives us, like the recent "Year of Joseph" or the "Year of St. Paul" back in 2008-2009, this "Year of Mercy" was an extraordinary jubilee year proclaimed by the Church where the great jubilee doors at St. Peter's and the other patriarchal basilicas were opened, where special indulgences were granted to the faithful, and where pilgrims to Rome and other holy sites were welcomed.

It was also the year I arrived at St. Anthony's, and I remember being inspired by the ongoing themes of grace and mercy which were visible nearly every week in the proclamation of the readings and the gospels at Mass. This year we read from the Gospel of Luke, and in the recent conference I attended in San Diego, I was privileged to hear Dr. John Bergsma, a professor of scripture at the Franciscan University of Steubenville, (OH,) offer his thoughts on the "central theme" of that gospel. (Dr. Bergsma is a frequent contributor to content on Formed.org, our Catholic multimedia site which each parishioner can find and join for thousands of hours of outstanding Catholic content.) Dr. Bergsma's entire series of



talks focused on what takes place in today's Gospel reading where Jesus announces a jubilee and a "year of favor from the Lord".

Dr. Bergsma explains that many of the great thematic events and teachings of the Gospel of Luke find their root in this proclaimation of Jubilee. Take for instance the Lord's Prayer itself. If we are a Jubilee People, who have experienced from God the release from debts and forgiveness of sins, the freedom from slavery, and the repatriation of our family lands, does it not match that we "forgive our debts as we forgive our debtors?" If we do not forgive our debtors, then we are not worthy of the debt forgiven us! We will hear the story of the "unforgiving servant". That story is prefaced by the question, 'how many times, Lord, should we forgive... seven times?" No, not seven times, by seventy times seven times... a multiplication of the number of perfection, "7". But seventy times seven times (490 years) is also the time given by the prophet Daniel, who noted that the Jewish people were profaning their Jubilees, not practicing forgiveness and freedom as directed by Levitical Law. As a result, they were told by the prophet that they would not see the Messiah until a jubilee of jubilees had passed (70 x 7 = 490 years), which was approximately correct, as Daniel wrote some 500-600 years before the coming of Christ.

What is the lesson about forgiveness? It is a necessary, vital part of being able and ready to enter the Kingdom of God. Mercy is a practice of Divine Love, and without that love in our hearts, we are not worthy of the Kingdom. The Unforgiving Servant was forgiven a great debt, and then held the smaller debts against his peers... he was not ready for the Kingdom of God.

But for those who have encountered God's love and who then reflect it to others, theirs is the Kingdom of God! We will hear this again in the Gospel of Luke whose version of the beatitudes affirms those in need of mercy and curses those who are rich. We will hear the two thieves at the cross... "If you are the Messiah, save yourself... and us!" (Lk 23:39) The first thief called on Christ in doubt, repeating the jeer of the Roman soldier just verses before... "save yourself!". The second thief recognized his sentence as just and pled with Jesus, "remember me when we you come into your kingdom." Jesus said, 'assuredly you will be with me this day in paradise." Paradise is that land and that Kingdom, sometimes recognized as Eden, where Adam and Eve walked with the Lord in the coolness of the evenings. It was forefeitted by the sin of Adam and Eve, and was now assured to be returned, first, to that repentant thief. Even on the Cross, Jesus was content on restoring that land which had been lost to us by perpetuating a Jubilee celebration that was not marked by time, but proclaimed in the person of Christ who came to forgive sins, once and for all.
