

I received a letter from the chaplaincy office at Blessing Hospital. Chaplain Tracy Armstrong shared with me the announcement that Deacon Harry Cramer was being honored as the Chaplain of the Month for January 2022 by the Chaplain Executive Committee at Blessing Hospital. Normally a representative from the chaplain's office comes out to give a public presentation of the award, but conditions. such as they are, have precluded such as celebration at this time.

Besides citing deacon for his outstanding work at the hospital in caring for patients, their families, and hospital staff, Blessing Hospital also acknowledged and gratefully thanked him (and thanked us, by extension, for sharing him with the hospital) for his nine years of service and his valuable contributions to the chaplaincy effort.

In the months since the height of the COVID crisis, the hospital chaplaincy and volunteer services all over our community have

been hurting. For many older volunteers, the shut-down of their charities and volunteer sites for COVID has been a good and reasonable opportunity to retire or to perhaps even just to slow down a little bit. This slowdown has been particularly hard on the hospital chaplaincy. The chaplaincy has always been a cooperative, interdenominational project among the churches of Quincy, but so many of our non-Catholic chaplains have been coming to retirement age and are not being replaced by their worshipping communities. While we priests and deacons provide for all of the particular spiritual and sacramental needs of Catholics, we have also traditionally had a visible presence in the hospital to provide for all who wish to see a chaplain in a nondenominational Christian (and even non-Christian) context as well. Over the last year or so, our deacon community has really stepped up to fill that need at our hospital. I am aware that besides Deacon Harry, Deacons Mike Ellerman (Mt. Sterling), Bob Lundberg (St. Peter's), and Jeff Wolf (St. Peter's) are all regularly serving day shifts and overnights at the hospital to make sure that everyone who comes through the doors over there can have the services of a chaplain. This is not an easy job, but it is one that the whole Quincy community can be grateful for. I include these other deacons in my compliments and congratulations not to minimize Deacon Harry's outstanding work, but to highlight it all the more and to explain how critical his contributions have been. Please congratulate Harry and thank him and his brothers in the diaconate when you see him in the parish and especially in the hospital. They are proving once again how valuable and important this ministry is in the life of the church and in our larger Quincy community.

Is this the time that maybe you could step up to help fill some of the gaps left by retirements of older volunteers with your favorite charities? The hospital is in need of daily Holy Communion ministers. Catholic Charities and the Ladies of Charity are always in need of hands and help. Adams County Right to Life does outstanding work in our community and will become all the more important to get the pro-life message out when, hopefully, *Roe v. Wade* is overruled this spring. Cursillo and TEC is restarting... if you have experienced one of these weekends, you know how many people it takes to run these operations. Maybe it's time to get active again or to sponsor someone who needs the gift of such an encounter? Besides charities and strictly religious activities, maybe it is perhaps about time to consider other ways to reach out and become active in the community again... bowling leagues, choirs and musical societies, the Knights of Columbus, fitness clubs, book studies, and other opportunities.

I quoted observations from a book I read some years ago called *Bowling Alone*, by Robert Putnam, who observed that the 'social capital' that exists between people has been breaking down in our society for decades... that bond of trust and belonging... that civic engagement that is the glue for our society... it has been lacking, and it shows in our politics, our patriotism, church attendance, and charitable giving. It seems that people in our society would rather go to bowling alleys to "bowl alone", abandoning bowling leagues for the sake of practicing and becoming a better bowler all by themselves, rather than belonging to a social group whose goals may not be so much bowling, but spending time together in a common cause. The most common explanation for withdrawing from others is that we are "too busy". Either we have allowed ourselves to lose connections with the world around us because of the all-consuming importance we place on our work In everyday life, or we find ourselves withdrawing because of simple, plain exhaustion.

As Christians, we understand that when we no longer live for ourselves, but for others, that we find our best selves. Perhaps as the COVID emergency starts to subside, this is the opportunity to look at where God has placed us, what gifts we have been given in time and energy, and to consider what gifts we have to give!


