A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



Recap from DC: The trip with our Eighth Graders was absolutely exhausting, but it was a beautiful time and an important experience for them and all of us on the trip. My hope is that future classes will be able follow this path and return in the years to come.

We arrived on the Monday when *Politico* broke the story of the leaked Supreme Court opinion on *Dobbs*, the case which is anticipated to overturn *Roe v. Wade* and return to the states the authority and duty to regulate abortion. Tuesday morning, we walked in front of the Supreme Court at about 9 am, where about 200 news reporters and perhaps 20 protesters had gathered. (I am to understand that the protests became more heated later in the day.) While we wanted the kids to see this, we did not want them to be taken advantage of by the protesters or the media who were

present, and so we instructed them not to engage the people there and to 'keep their eyes open and heads on swivels'. We know that the pro-abortion forces would not look with a friendly eye on a group of Catholic school kids who just happened to walking through that morning, but we also knew that any of us could become a target for an unfriendly media as well. We simply wanted them to think about the contrast—anger and self-pity, lies, half-truths, and coercion, swearing and violence, contrasted with the simple, wholesome message that every life is valued. This solemn belief rooted not only in our faith but in the creed of our nation places a moral imperative on us to act accordingly. One can only imagine how difficult a 'crisis pregnancy' might be in the life of someone we love, but it is a worthy and righteous struggle that makes us a better nation and each of us better people as we choose to care for the most vulnerable among us.

While eighth graders might not have the intellectual or rhetorical capacity yet to argue in the public square, they can certainly comprehend the contrast. Indeed, even for those of us who might have had the daring to trust in intellect and rhetoric, there are some arguments that simply go nowhere with those who refuse to be reasoned with. As we saw with the Nick Sandman case at the 2019 March for Life, sometimes the best thing one can do when a detractor is staring you down is not to punch them in the nose or engage their bad arguments, but just return stare and smile. This showdown drove the media nuts. They were furious that one prolife teenager could stare down the opposition fearlessly and righteously, and so they tried to destroy him. Now they are paying for their actions in the defamation lawsuits being won by this courageous teenager.

While there are many economic, geo-political, cultural, and ideological arguments which occupy our attention as a nation in this moment, above all we must realize that the battle for the soul of our nation is taking place within the precincts of the Court. The questions before the Court right now do not seem to directly address the question of recognizing the right to life for the unborn. Rather, the leaked opinion seems to indicate that that the barriers from having that discussion in our state and local governments are likely to be removed so that the discussion—the comparison of world views—might be in the light for all to see. The actual effect of the original *Roe* ruling was not specifically to legalize abortion, but to embargo the discussion at the federal level prevent states and other governmental units from imposing restrictions on a practice which many rightfully see as the ending of innocent human life. For Catholics and Christians who respect the human life, we will continue to be seen as 'radicals', because our position is not aligned merely with sophistries of legal argument and maneuvering, but rather in the absolute dignity which we ascribe to those created in the image and likeness of God... the creed enshrined in our Declaration of Independence that all men and women possess an inalienable right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. This is the position we proclaim in a world which has been defaced by the "Culture of Death" and which prefers the darkness and the silence to the light of God's life shining in all of his children.

The discussion in the public square about the inalienable dignity of human life is precisely what scares those who favor abortion and many of the other evils of our world and society—that they will have to defend their position in the light of reasoned public scrutiny and dialogue where everyone has a right to speak and present arguments, rather than hiding behind a defective piece of jurisprudence (*Roe*) and simply telling the opposition, "shut up, it's the law". Not only do opponents of the dignity of life practice the "shut up" strategy to silence opposition, but it seems that the very media whose job it is to bring us news conspires to short-circuit discussion of the important issues of our day. Contemporary news media is simply not equipped to debate important issues in our society, preferring to have opposing personalities shout 'talking points' at each other for five minute intervals between commercial breaks instead.

The early Church recognized that the world was biased against them, and so what did they do? They prayed that through the Holy Spirit would give them the words they need, when they needed them (Luke 12:12). Perhaps those words do not belong in the court of public opinion, which at this point is biased against not only Christian truth but common decency. Rather our words belong in fervent prayer to Almighty God that we as a nation might finally break the 50 year stalemate that has effectively made abortion the law of the land. I ask you to join me in daily offering just a little prayer to the Spirit that, as the Court finishes its deliberations and releases its final opinion in the coming weeks, that we will be filled with the grace of the Holy Spirit to enter into this moment with a renewed commitment to promoting the dignity of human life. As we have discussed in recent weeks while reading Revelations as our second reading on Sundays, when the old order passes away, there will be rage against the Church and her people. We will have attacks to endure in the coming weeks and months as well, but we know where this ends. God's grace will not be denied. It may be delayed. It may be momentarily eclipsed by the grotesque face of all that is evil in this world, but it will not be denied. Pray for our nation and our Supreme Court justices. A new day is about to dawn on us as a nation and as a people who value human life.

Kindergarten Leaders-Our Lady with the Golden Heart

During the month of May, our Kindergarten class along with their teacher, Mrs. Waters, and Teacher Aide, Mrs. Struck, lead Morning Assemblies to help our school learn about Our Lady with the Golden Heart. Throughout this year, we have learned that Mary is an amazing disciple that listens to God's call and always shows us the way to Jesus. This month, we have learned that on Nov. 29, 1932, five children in the village of Beauraing, Belgium, had a vision of the Blessed Virgin Mary dressed all in white, walking above them on a railway bridge. Then, over the next five weeks, the children reported 32 more visits from the Blessed Mother, with the final visit on Jan. 3, 1933. The children described Mary as wearing a long white dress with a white veil, a golden crown of light, and her hands together in prayer in front of her chest. During her appearance on Dec. 29, Mary opened her arms to display a golden heart. Mary communicated with children rather than with adults. Even though the children were startled, they showed enthusiasm for learning from the apparition experience. The children's positive, openhearted attitudes may have been why Mary chose to send her messages through the children.
