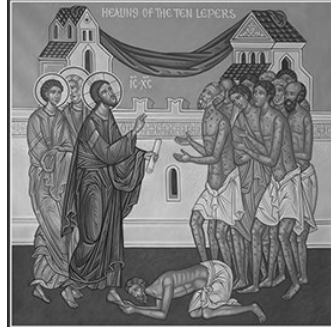

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan—

Ten Lepers approached Jesus asking to be healed. Jesus instructed them to show themselves to a priest according to Mosaic Law, that they might be restored in the community. One, a Samaritan, realizing he was healed, returned to Jesus in thanksgiving: "Your faith has saved you!"

We have often heard about the political and social strife between the Jewish and Samaritan peoples. The Samaritans descended from the Tribes of Ephraim and Manasseh (both sons of Joseph). At some point in the history of the peoples, perhaps at the time of the Babylonian exile, the northern (Samaritan) people of Canaan (comprising much of what we recognize today as the area of the "West Bank") became separated from the Southern Kingdom of the Israelites. The Southern Kingdom was routed by the exile and captivity while remnants of the Samaritan peoples remained in their territorial claims and continue to do so to this day. When the Exile ended, two distinct peoples came to be identifiable through the differences in their religious practices. The Samaritans practiced their faith on Mt. Gerazim, the original holy place where Joshua conquered Canaan, while the Jews practiced their faith on the Temple Mount, on which Solomon later built the temple in Jerusalem. Both religions thought of the other as "revisionary"... that they had changed important tenants of belief in the one true God, and as such, each suspected the other to be "heretics". Thus for Jesus to say "your faith has saved you" has a particularly surprising tone to it. How can a faith perceived as imperfect or perhaps even heretical have any power to save? I think it has less to do with being ascribed to one camp or another, but that one recognizes the power flowing through the hands of Christ himself.

To project Jesus' teaching and example into our own age, I think it has much to say about the divisions in the Christian Church. It is not to say that the differences between modern-day followers of Christ are unimportant. We recognize that as Catholics, we have a full measure of the faith, and we have an obligation to hold that faith 'integrally'... in its fullness... forming ourselves to greater understanding and acceptance, even when difficult or confusing. In the Second Vatican Council document, *Dei verbum*, it is explained that the fullness of the faith, "subsists" in visible union within the Catholic Church, which is the "general means" of salvation. We understand this as saying that God intends to save his people; typically, through the ministry of the Catholic Church. That being said, in Christian communities of "imperfect communion" there remain elements of sanctification and truth which have an 'inner dynamism' towards Catholic unity. Should it surprise us that our Lord may choose to save those who are not in 'perfect communion' with the Catholic Faith through some kind of 'special means' of salvation? Perhaps not. Doing so would be consistent with the greatness of his mercy. Thus, while we have a positive obligation to seek and adhere to the fullness of the truth as it is revealed to us, those who through no fault of their own find themselves outside the visible union with the One Church, yet recognize Jesus as their God and savior, may very well have a path through extraordinary (non-sacramental) means to be saved, rooted in the primacy in faith. This was a groundbreaking statement on part of the Church, but it is consistent with the struggle that the Church has had in explaining how God could bring about the salvation for all people. The Church herself, through errors of its leaders and people, must recognize some responsibility for disunity, as in certain times people of good will righteously turned their backs on the more repugnant events of her history when Church failed to adequately witness to the faith.

It remains important that the Church maintain its missionary and evangelical zeal to reach all people in all places at all times, as it is the fullness of faith expressed by the Church which is the surest means of salvation, and the way God intends to communicate his love and presence through the objective means of the sacraments. His "Real Presence" in the sacraments is a fitting and most perfect way to experience God's love, in comparison to imperfect, subjective experiences that lack the witness and faith of the Church. While there would be a lot more to say to explain the mystery of God's salvation to all through the ministry of the Catholic Church, I think we find a hint in the love and affection shown by Jesus to his 'separated brother' of the Samaritan faith in today's Gospel.
