

In the book of Sirach we hear that God ... "is a God of justice who knows no favorites... the prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds, it does not rest until it reaches its goal, nor will it withdraw until the Highest responds, judges justly, and affirms the right." Jesus might have had this scripture in mind when he told the story of the Persistent Woman in Luke 18. Jesus' words are that we are not to lose heart, but to be persistent in asking for what we need, not unlike the persistent woman in this week's parable. She wore down the unjust magistrate with her pleading until she got her way. The message of this parable underlines the virtues of persistence and patience, for sure, but even more importantly, the final words of Jesus remind us that if the judge. who is unjust and slow to act will turn to the pleadings of the people, all the more will the God who is good answer those who call upon him in faith and confidence!

How slowly the wheels of justice work! Martin Luther King quoted the famous maxim in his letter from the Birmingham Jail how "justice too long delayed is justice denied". The Romans said *In diem vivere in lege sunt detestabilis*, which simply translated says 'delays in the law are hateful' But this maxim has a more urgent sense in the literal translation: "being at law when living day to day is detestable"... that is, when struggling to obtain justice, being poor and in need is an even greater, detestable burden. The Sixth Amendment to the Constitution in Bill of Rights enshrines the "right to a speedy trial," such that citizens are not hamstrung with long legal proceedings when accused of a crime or in need of justice from the court system. The demands of justice require diligence and fairness, for sure, but also a measure of swiftness and certainty.

God stands ready and has been waiting for all eternity to hear and answer our prayers, so why do some examples of divine justice seem so far off or so long-delayed? We always remember that "God's ways are not our ways" (Is 55:8), And in the same vein we recall that God's justice is not mere worldly justice. For one, justice and mercy are not at odds in the mind of God. Further, divine justice in this world is tempered by time to encourage growth and conversion which brings about *justification* rather than damnation. The persistent woman draws out the link between God's love of justice and the sanctification of our wills and hearts that the discipline of faithful prayer inspires when we place even our most urgent needs before God.




On Sunday Afternoon (October 16), the Secular Carmelites will be offering a Holy Hour at St. Anthony Church. The Secular Carmelites is a "public association of the faithful" who commit themselves to the ideals of the Carmelite Order by cultivating a life of prayer, study, charity, and virtue. Carmelites are historically linked to Mt. Carmel near the modern city of Haifa in Israel. This is the site where Elijah resided in a cave and in the 18th chapter of 1 Kings challenged the 450 priests of Baal to a duel between their gods and the God of

Israel. The Carmelites are distinguished by their devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and a few dozen saints who share their charism, including St. John of the Cross, St. Simon Stock, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross (Edith Stein), and sixteen Carmelite Martyrs of Compiegne. The Holy Hour starts at 3pm with exposition in St. Anthony Church. The local Secular Carmelite community meets on the First Saturday of the month after the 8am Mass at St. Rose Church.
