

This year we read from the Gospel of St. Matthew. Matthew is an interesting character, as he is associated with the figure who was a publican— a tax collector—one of the most reviled people of Jewish society. Tax collectors were hated, first due to their cooperation with occupying Roman force. Secondly, the tax-collecting practices of the day always had a suspicion of corruption and favoritism. As a tax collector, Matthew would have been literate and probably keen in observing the interaction of people and politics. Understandably, Matthew's gospel reveals a Jesus who deftly moves from one interaction to the next, expressing himself clearly and convincingly, and managing to evade 'traps' set for him.

In the Gospel of Matthew, so many scenes present a dilemma—a debated point of law or morality. This is the classic ways rabbis, even to this day, teach the law and the prophets. We are invited us to take sides and to challenge our precon-

ceptions about religion and faith and social conventions as Jesus shows us the right way to respond to the debate. For instance, Matthew watches intently at how Jesus interacts with the Romans: "Give unto Caesar that which is Caesar's. Give to God, that which is God's" (Matt 22:21). Jesus heals the centurion's servant, turning then to the people to remark at the great faith in the centurion, even compared to the Jewish audience (Matt 8:5-13). Jesus proclaims love for enemies (Matt 5:44) and forbearance toward their commands (Matt 5:40, 41). In turn we also see Matthew's concern over Jesus treatment of the religious elite of the temple and the messianic titles "Son of David", and "Son of God", and "Son of man". Matthew also spends time interpreting the signs of the natural and supernatural order which point to Jesus as a special figure among the Jewish prophets and teachers.

Matthew's readings are balanced for the first part of the summer with readings presented from Paul's letter to the Romans. Paul is concerned with the divergence between God's People gathered by the Law (the Jewish people) and God's people gathered in witness to the savior (the "new law", or "new covenant"). The law united God's people throughout the Old Testament days, but Christ came to teach that the Law was but a starting point on the road to true wisdom and religious faith. It is not the Law or our punctilious observance of the Law that leads to salvation, but it is our relationship with the Lawgiver himself that perfects our encounter with God's Law.
