August 20, 2023 Twentieth Week of Ordinary Time

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



In this week's Gospel, Jesus finds himself in the far-north reaches of the region of Tyre and Sidon. These two cities are on the coast of the Mediterranean Sea, about 20-40 miles south of the modern-day city of Beruit. The residents of Canaan and the Jews have a long history of unfriendliness caused by many factors, not the least of which was the displacement of the Canaanite peoples as the Jews entered into their "Promised Land". Jesus knew that his end was near, and he was not able to travel about freely in Palestine without great crowds following. So Jesus and his disciples were having some free-time in advance of going to Jerusalem to encounter his passion.

A woman identified as a "Syrophoenician" by Matthew, asks innocently enough for assistance from Jesus, calling out the Messianic title, "Son of David!" She asks for her daughter to be delivered from a demon. What follows is surprising. Jesus insults her. "I am here for the lost sheep of Israel!" She persists, but Je-sus in-

tensifies his insult: "You do not feed to the dogs that which belongs to the children!" And then she turns on Jesus, "but even dogs eat what falls from the master's table." With this Jesus relents and extols her persistent faith. Her daughter is saved.

It is hard to consider exactly how to interpret these passages--Jesus wasn't simply having a bad day. But why was he testing her... so harshly? One thing that comes to mind is to recognize the importance of persistence... even in the face of dishonor. Jesus was going up to Jerusalem to die... would his followers have the toughness to push back against the small insults? Some look at Jesus as a purely serene, even pacifist figure. What we see here is a bit of his toughness. Do you have what it takes to follow me? Show me.

It concerns me when people have their feelings hurt by 'the Church' or, more properly, by the 'people in the Church'. I regret that sometimes I myself have been at the center of those problems either as a leader who has to do what I have to do, or sometimes through the faults that sometimes slip out of my own human weaknesses. I, too, have also known the feelings of betrayal at the hands of the Church—it's an awful feeling to deal with and it is very hard on one's faith. We have all perhaps, heard stories of things that happened many years or decades ago, perhaps involving very minor issues that have significantly impaired one's relationship with the Church to this very day. The work of reconciliation is never-ending in the life of the Church, and it is often tremendously challenging.

The solution to these challenges involve promoting greater civility between all members of the Church, of course, and also making courageous and humble efforts to promote understanding and reconciliation for those who feel offended. I think our Gospel encourages us to take a wider view of our relationship with the Church. While the Church is of divine origin, it is always in a state of ongoing purification while its members strive to become, truly one in the Body of Christ. It is rarely easy-going as we struggle to live in cooperation, humility, and mutual understanding.

Do we have the confidence that God is part of this process... even in the process of 'smoothing the edges' that are in each of us? One of the signs of a strong Church is how it deals with aversity within its ranks. Usually there are no easy answers to many of the 'rubs' that develop in our life together, but by having the faith to call on God and the persistent courage to stand with what is truly good, while really listening to each other will aid us in our lives together.

This afternoon (Sunday, August 20), the Secular Carmelites are hosting a Holy Hour at 3pm at St. Anthony Church. All are invited to join them for an hour of worship, and join them in their intentions for the parish priests of the Quincy area. The Secular Carmelites meet locally on a monthly basis to encourage one another in their call to deeper spiritual lives. From a 2016 Catholic Times article, here is a short description of their charism:

A secular Carmelite makes a commitment to live the Beatitudes, a way of life to enter into a relationship with neighbors, co-workers, families and friends. They spend a minimum of 30 minutes each day in solitary prayer. A person's state of life and daily duties may dictate that this period may be broken down into two 15-minute periods. They attend daily Mass when possible, recite the Morning and Evening Prayers of the Divine Office, frequent the sacraments, observe the days of fasting and penance of the church as well as those prescribed in the Secular Order Constitution. They attend monthly meetings and wear the brown scapular of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel as a sign of commitment to the order.

The local Carmelite community meets at 8:00 am on the First Saturday of the month at St. Rose Church. Those who might be interested in finding out more about the Secular Order of the Carmelites can contact Virginia Drew at (217) 222-6054
