

When they approached Caesarea Philippi, Jesus asked his disciples, 'who do people say that the Son of Man is?" After a number of replies Peter said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God!" And with that, Peter announces the drama that has been building in the Gospel of Matthew, and would come to its fulfillment as Jesus continues to Jerusalem.

The mission of the 'Son of Man' would require self-sacrifice. It would require obedience to the Father. It would lead to him to be captured by those who would wish to do him harm, with all the evil forces in the world converging on him. In doing so, Jesus would vanquish all sin by rising again on the Third Day.

The disciples were warned not to tell others... to keep the secret for now. The forces of evil did not need to know all of this quite yet. Jesus needed to protect his friends. He also needed them to stay with him for a bit longer that they could learn more a bit more of what his mission was all about. Peter, after all, was being built up to be the "Rock", looking beyond the Resurrection and Ascension of our Lord, to the day when the Church would take up the mission of Christ itself.

But why did Jesus choose this time, this place, to reveal his true identity to his disciples? The disciples had witnessed this in his ministry and were aware of his special powers. But, by revealing his identity as Lord and Son of the Living God, I think he was also revealing that not only was he with them in the moments of might and miracles, but also in those routine moments. He didn't abandon his disciples by snapping his fingers and travelling across the vast wastelands of desert in seconds. He didn't leave them alone to do "God things" while they took the time to eat or sleep when the day was done. He didn't shower them with earthly riches to feed the multitudes or even provide relief to the poor. He stayed with them in these quiet moments, using the goods and blessings of nature to sustain his earthly ministry. He not only blessed the common with his presence, but taught his disciples that the Lord God of the Universe immersed himself completely in their lives... even the more mundane moments that perhaps pass unnoticed to the witness of the Gospel. He was not a God of disguises and secret identities, but the Divine Presence which endures with his people in great and small moments alike.



It is with great joy I announce that **Mr. Parker Brown**, son of **David & Cindy Brown** of the parish, has been accepted and will be beginning studies and formation as a seminarian for the **Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter** (FSSP), beginning in September. Parker is a 2021 graduate of Quincy Notre Dame and a 2017 graduate of St. Dominic School. He has most recently been attending John Wood Community College. You will likely recognize Parker as the heart and soul of our "Pius IX Servers" group assisting at weekend and holy day Masses. (...and yes, the group will continue under the leadership of Braden Brown, his brother... thanks!)

The Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter is a worldwide community of Catholic Priests working under the authority of the Holy See for the formation and sanctification of priests and for the care of souls entrusted to them as pas-

tors and chaplains. They accomplish this mission by way of celebrating and preserving the ancient rites of the Church through the liturgical texts and practices of the 1962 *Missale Romanum*. Locally, the ministry of the FSSP is on display at St. Rose Church, here in Quincy.

Priestly formation is an arduous path to follow, and all who dare to enter such formation is not without the challenge of accepting God's grace day-by-day while developing, however imperfectly, the intellectual rigor and virtuous habits necessary to assume such a ministry. It is God's grace at work over those years and experiences which transform a young man into one who can be ready to accept the graces and responsibilities of Holy Orders. The Fraternity has a comprehensive seven-year process which engages spiritual, human, intellectual, and pastoral elements of personal formation, with the first year being a propaedeutic (spiritual) year, followed by two years of (undergraduate) philosophy studies and four years of (graduate) theological studies.

The FSSP "Our Lady of Guadalupe Seminary" is near in Denton, Nebraska, which itself is only a few miles outside of the state capitol of Lincoln, NE. Parishioners and friends are encouraged to write, as Parker will not have regular cell phone or e-mail access: The mailing address is: Our Lady of Guadalupe Seminary, 7880 Denton Road, Denton, NE 68339. We look forward to seeing Parker when he has a break after Christmas, and we wish him well in his studies. My friends, our parish once again has a seminarian... I ask that you remember him in your prayers each day as God's grace is revealed in his formation and he intensely discerns the call to priestly ministry.

A new grassroots effort is underway to limit abortion at the local level. The federal "Comstock Act" prohibits mailing and receiving abortion-inducing drugs and paraphernalia. A proposed ordinance would call for the lawful enforcement of the Comstock Act in Quincy, thus making our city a safer-haven for the unborn. Because of Quincy's location on the Missouri border, our community is vulnerable to
