September 10, 2023 Twenty-Third Week of Ordinary Time

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:

"Am I my brother's keeper?" This question haunts the fourth chapter of Genesis after Cain murders his brother, Abel. Abel's blood indeed cries out, echoing through Sacred Scripture, arriving at the situation in today's Gospel. And so, "Am I my brother's keeper?" The obvious answer is, "of course!" We are responsible for our brothers and sisters, and not only for bodily safety, but also for his or her spiritual welfare. Indeed, the prophet Ezekiel reminds us that we must warn the wicked of their ways, and in doing so save




not only their life, but ours as well! (Ez 33: 7-9) Paul tells us that we are to owe each other no debt, except the debt of love (*cf* Rom 13:8-9) Love, of course, is not a mere feeling or emotion. In its perfection, love is the desire for the ultimate good of others. How important to realize the greatest good for another is in their spiritual welfare.

Jesus impressed upon his disciples the great lengths that one should take to reconcile with way-ward brothers. Matthew 18 explains: we are to tell him his fault... we gather witnesses... we involve the church... and then, if all else fails, we treat them as Gentile or tax collector, which also obligates the disciple of Christ to treat the wayward brother with love. Love does not justify rejection of the sinner, but instead calls for an intense effort to bring the wayward one back. That is the debt of love for those who themselves know the love and mercy of Almighty God. For "Love does no evil to the neighbor; hence, love is the fulfillment of the Law." (Rom 13:10)

The Church recognizes the efforts to 'admonish the sinner' as one of the seven 'spiritual works of mercy'. Most people dislike conflict. Fewer people enjoy being corrected. It is natural to become defensive. It is hard to speak up, and doing so seems to run counter to the modern trend of not being 'judgmental'. It is sometimes hard to separate 'fraternal correction' from our own anger. But this is what we are 'on' for as followers of Christ. We are our 'brothers' keepers', and if we can save them from their faults, we win our brothers and sisters from the evil one.

This weekend we are beginning our reviews of our liturgical ministries for Sunday Mass. This week, we look at the ministry and role of Lectors—those who proclaim the Word of God at Mass.



The ministry of the Lector may seem antiquated in our day. Lectors of the past were ministers in "Minor Orders"... the preparatory stages before Holy Orders. Receiving the order of "Lector" recognized particular skills and learning that could be of service to the Church. In an age where few people learned how to read, to be raised to the Lectorate signified that the candidate was fluent in proclaiming the written word so that all could hear. All members could then be 'equal' in the community... those who could read along with those who couldn't.

So, in our contemporary age, why don't we save time and deal with the Word in a more 21st-century kind of way? We don't need to have someone read to us like we are children! We have printing presses and most everyone has a bible at home. Almost everyone knows how to read. Why not say, "your assignment for next week is to review the 18th chapter of

Matthew? Do your homework and we'll talk about it next week... sort of like a college professor would do with his class. Perhaps this would place a greater expectation on people to prepare for the next week's Mass? Maybe we could hire Morgan Freeman or James Earl Jones or Jim Obert to record the readings and include appropriate background music and sound effects to enhance the production value... and then play that back at Mass or have everyone subscribe to the Podcast instead of having it read 'live', with all of the propensity for mistakes... or people not showing up... or tripping over odd names... or not being heard because of the sound system?

There is something valuable about actually proclaiming the Word at Mass. When the Word of God is "proclaimed" (and not simply 'read') at Mass, it takes on a living quality... not in a dramatic or over-wrought presentation, not in being an academic exercise... but in being an active presence among us when we gather in worship. That active presence is expressed in ministry— a personal act of service to the community as well as an act of worship to God on part of the one who ministers. Good ministry increases faith, not only in the minister, but also in those to whom they minister. And so, when we work to do the ministry of Lector well as a community, we participate in a personal act of service and worship taking place in the Sacred Liturgy. It is the Word that reveals the meaning of the mysteries, the Sacraments, to all who are gathered.

Parish Registration If you are new to St. Anthony Church or have been coming for a while, please register with our parish. Registering is important to ensure you will receive infrequent emails from the parish email and envelopes to support our parish. It is also important to establish your parish should you be asked to be a godparent or sponsor for Confirmation. Many parishes require a letter from your parish stating that you are registered, contributing, and regularly attending Mass. Please contact our office or place a note in the collection basket with your name and contact information. We will then send you a registration form by mail or email. join us and get involved with our St. Anthony Parish.

HOSPITAL MINISTRY Lay Eucharistic Ministers are asked to consider expanding their ministry by providing Holy Eucharist to Catholic patients at Blessing Hospital. Eucharistic Ministers usually volunteer monthly for at least two shifts (about 2 hours each). They visit patients, pray with them, distribute communion and make priest referrals for those in need. Our requirements have recently

A new grassroots effort is underway to limit abortion at the local level. The federal "Comstock Act" prohibits mailing and receiving abortion-inducing drugs and paraphernalia. A proposed ordinance would call for the lawful enforcement of the Comstock Act in Quincy, thus making our city a safer-haven for the unborn. Because of Quincy's location on the Missouri border, our community is vulnerable to possible efforts on part of the abortion industry to establish clinics or even deploy a mobile
