Fourth Sunday of Lent - March 9-10, 2024

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



Rejoice Jerusalem: and come together all who love her. Rejoice with joy, you that have been in sorrow, that you may exult and be filled with consolation!

The Fourth Sunday of Lent, "Laetare Sunday" lies just beyond the half-way point of the forty days of Lent. It is not merely a marker of time, but this Sunday is also meant to be a day of encouragement, for the celebration of Easter draws near! Even while we intensify our fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, more perfectly denying ourselves in imitation of the suffering Christ, the glory of the resurrection shines through us!

Today we hear a reading from the Second Book of Chronicles. These are perhaps the saddest of days in the history of God's people, when they were swallowed up in darkness and despair. The temple had been burned and looted. Those who survived the sword were taken to Babylon in chains. The prophets announced a curse over the nation until the people had "made up their lost Sabbaths" and returned to worship of the one, true God, forsaking their worldliness. Seventy years would pass, dooming this generation and the next to a time of purification through trials and tribulations.

Many have commented over the centuries that the God of the Old Testament and the God of the New Testament almost seem to be different Gods... in the Old Testament we frequently hear of people receiving their comeuppance after offending God or going against his ways. This is drawn in stark contrast to the divine love and mercy so frequently expressed by our Lord, Jesus Christ. What do we make of these differences?

Divine chastisement is not simply the response of a God who has been offended or who resorts to be throwing some kind of divine temper-tantrum when his people go astray. God is not simply resorting to some kind of system of "karma" where in order to balance accounts good things come to those who have had bad happen to them and bad things happen to those who have received good. Typically divine chastisement comes as part of an effort to communicate Divine Love to those who have distanced themselves from God and his ways, in order to get their attention and then to draw them back. The effects of that chastisement can be severe, but the result of this 'tough love' is to turn at least a remnant of the people back.

Consider the Prodigal Son who rebelled against the father, selling his inheritance to live a dissolute life. Finding himself separated, isolated, demeaned, and dishonored, the son resolved to turn back to the father, even if only to be a servant in the household that household which was once his legacy. Sometimes it takes hitting "rock bottom" to realize the need for change. It can be a rough ride on the way down. It can be humiliating to realize the indignity of being found at that 'bottom', but that experience can be transformative if we let it. God's chastisement is hardly easy or enjoyable, but after making that choice to turn away from our own self-destruction, we often have so much to the thankful for when we look back. Our sins, even the darkest experiences of life, can draw us closer to God. It is unfortunate to bear the temporary suffering of those moments, but only through that difficulty, sometimes, we learn a greater love for God.

Coupled with the heartbreaking story of God's people going into exile, the Church also gives us the famous passage from the Gospel of John: For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish, but might have eternal life. For God did not send his son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved in him.

Lent is a time for penance but also a time for a kind of rejoicing. Sin has exiled us from our natural state of happiness and holiness, but our exile need not be eternal. Even God's chastisement is illuminated by Divine Love. Our God aches to draw us to himself, out of the darkness of our own doing and back into his marvelous light. We may undergo our own times of tribulation and exile, but hope comes through the Blood of the Savior who walked the full distance of god-forsakenness to gather his people and bring them back in the Joy of the Resurrection. Such power in the words of John 3:16! it is the 'mission statement' of our savior!
