A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



The Greek word for "steward" or "manager" in this week's gospel is "oikonomos" from where we also get the word "economy" or "economist". The subject of the parable certainly knows how to use the value of the things he manages in order to provide for himself as he sees the master preparing to dismiss him. Modernday managers know all-too-well how important it is for an employee to empty out his or her desk and turn in their keys right away and to leave the property when being dismissed. But the master in this story is a permissive one... perhaps on purpose?

The "steward-economist" knows the value of all of the master's property and he further knows the price of the debts for all the master's debtors. He quickly schemes how he can make for a 'soft landing' for himself by ingratiating the master's debtors to him! We clearly see the ethical shortcut and the devious game being played here as he cuts the debtors bills an rewrites them a discount. We question why Jesus would praise this *criminal* be-

havior. I would suggest we turn away from such a harsh judgment against the steward and consider that the master may have allowed this behavior as a gracious gesture to the steward. The master did not, after all, summarily dismiss the steward, but allowed him to 'close the accounts' as his agent in the last days.

Is this not unlike God's posture towards us? Someday won't we be turning our 'accounting books' to see how our stewardship of the goods we have been entrusted with measures up? While salvation is not found in good works, we certainly may be unprepared and unprovided for if we cling to the seduction of wealth and the worldly power it holds.

We have greatly endowed with worldly riches by God's gracious bounty... our nourishment, our homes, our livelihoods, and perhaps even some sense of long-term financial security. If we do not know how to be good stewards in the wise use of these earthly goods, using them for trade and commerce and most importantly giving them away in charity for those in need, then how can we be ready to accept the even greater gift of the heavenly goods God wills to give us in his Kingdom? Do we know the worldly price of everything without understanding transcendent value? The steward knew how to extract the greatest value from these goods by sharing the master's wealth with fellow debtors. Should we not do the same? This is yet another way that we learn to "live the Year of Jubilee from the Lord" by proclaiming good news to captives, forgiving debts, and restoring the dispossessed to their heritage. If we are unable to live this graciously with our fellow human beings, then perhaps we are not ready for the jubilee God sets before us?




